Housing Stabilization that Works

How can you ensure at least four out of five people you serve stay housed forever, especially if they have higher acuity? Building on more than two decades of research, practice and evaluation, this two day workshop will walk participants through the essential tasks and important practices that will increase housing retention, while also lowering the household's acuity and improving quality of life. It will also teach you which data to track, how to track it, and what it means to have powerful housing stability dashboards. Furthermore, a leading expert in landlord engagement will walk participants through very successful approaches to landlord recruitment and retention. There are three specific streams with customized instruction: youth, families, and single adults.

Coordinated Entry

How do you get the right household to the right intervention in the right order without just having fancy waiting lists? Are you coordinating for shelter entry, housing programs, or both? Do you find yourself



completely frustrated by the notion of By Name Lists? This workshop focuses on sorting out the messy details of fluid data in a complicated service delivery system in a way that is driven by science, not guess work. Attendees learn how to remove subjectivity and side doors from their service delivery system, and leverage their HMIS to make the process more efficient and effective. Participants can expect to also gain deep knowledge of effective diversion programs, and approaches for empowering natural resiliencies in people seeking services. Attendees will learn the types of decisions they need to make as a community, how to work through establishing community priorities, and how to operationally households into the solution to their homelessness. Even communities that are chugging along with a coordinated entry system in its infancy will find this two day workshop valuable. Plus you can lay to rest any foggy understanding you may have with concepts like "functional zero". There are also specific streams for families, youth, and single adults.

Being an Awesome Shelter

For too long, many shelters have exercised therapeutic incarceration – adding more and more programs within them that do not have a direct bearing on long-term housing success and which can



actually incentivize homelessness. On the other hand, some shelters are so sparse in service delivery that it is no wonder there is no connection to permanent solutions. This 1.5 day workshop focuses on transforming shelters as a critical part of ending homelessness when they have a strong housing orientation. From intake procedures to staff engagement strategies; rules to barring practices; built form considerations to approaches to housing engagement – this Learning Clinic is rich in not just provocative content, but also practical adjustments shelters can make to improve positive destinations out of shelter. This clinic also features specialized streams for families, youth, and single adults.

It is possible to help a person move directly from the woods, a street corner, vehicle, bridge, overpass, abandoned building, beach, etc. directly into housing. Getting there, though, requires a rethink of what street outreach should be doing and how it should be performing those functions. This 1.5 day workshop moves from charitable approaches that have historically informed the practice of street



outreach into solution focused approaches that equip practitioners with the tools needed to help people move successfully directly into housing – and remain there. From rapport building to data collection, prioritization of time to connections with other systems, this workshop helps attendees hit the ground running when they return to their home community.

Excellence in HMIS Practice & Using Your Performance Data

Data is a four letter word (it's true – count the letters). In community after community, data goes in to a machine and never seems to see the light of day in informing day to day practice, policy making, annual funding, or even measuring program or system performance. This 1.5 day workshop is designed for your community's data lead to come and hear from the masters on how to leverage your data to kick ass in your community's programs. The nerd factor will be high in this session that goes under the hood of your data system and tells you – very practically – how to make all that you do driven by awesome data.

Some things to know about each of the sessions:

- One of OrgCode's mottos is "Training that doesn't suck." Expect some edutainment. You will learn and be entertained. You will be challenged. You will be provoked. You will be engaged.
- ➢ We will give you everything you need. You will get a ton of material at the workshop. You are welcome to feverishly take notes, but you should be able to make those notes on stuff we give you.
- We believe in inclusion, not just diversity. Expect this work to be examined from that lens.
- The backbone of our approach is making a difference. Expect stuff to be practical and what we have seen work. If you are looking for a debate, this is going to be the wrong type of thing to come to.
- ➤ We are going to tell you what we think things like "trauma informed" and "strength based" and "evidence informed" mean as we go through the sessions. We are not going to spew jargon without context.
- We have kept them as affordable as we can. We maybe even lose money on some of them. We don't care. This is the right thing to do.
- We are NOT trying to tackle topics that other firms do really well. For example, we are not doing sessions on Motivational Interviewing because we think that T3 does an awesome job of that; we have no session on population analytics because we think Focus Strategies kicks butt at that; we have nothing planned around Rapid ReHousing because the National Alliance to End Homelessness is tearing that up. We are ADDING VALUE to the work you do, not trying to compete with others we respect and tip our hat to.
- There are Canadians and Americans on the OrgCode team. There are Canadian and American communities working on the same stuff. We are DELIBERATELY trying to create opportunities for people to come to each other's countries and learn, share, grow and network.
- We are grateful to the Canadian Alliance to End Homelessness who are helping to support and get the word out for all of the Canadian sessions.
- We are doing these sessions now. If they go great, we will quite likely repeat them. But our starting point is that until we understand how well they are received and whether or not they work in practice when people return home, we are not making future promises. So, if you think these would be valuable, come now! Don't wait to see if we do them again. Space is limited in each Learning Clinic. As soon as they sell out (and many will) that is it.
