<u>Veith House</u> is located at <u>3115 Veith Street</u>, and parking directions from Lisa Roberts (Veith House ED) are pasted below:

"There is one hour and two hour time limited on Veith Street. If you require longer parking times we suggest parking at Needham Park - at the north end of Union St, or along Kenny Street or Devonshire Avenue near the Family Court and Needham Centre, or along Albert Street between Devonshire and Duffus. Each of these locations is an approximately 10 minute walk to Veith House. Veith House is also accessible by bus, particularly the #9 but also the #7 to Novalea (about a 5 minute walk). Finally, there is unlimited accessible parking immediately in front of Veith House."

Free Winter Tracking Series hosted by Friends of Redtail Society

Friends of Redtail Society will be hosting a winter tracking series on Sundays in the month of February. The event is free and will take place at 1 pm on February 7, 14, 21 and 28.

The event invites participants to see animals through the eyes of the track. Winter is an excellent time to study nature's signatures. Each afternoon we will track local fauna, including Deer, Coyote, Fisher and Snowshoe Hare, which live on and around Friends of Redtail land, near Scotsburn, Pictou County.

Friends of Redtail Society Board Members, Billy MacDonald and Joella Arsenault will lead the tracking series. MacDonald is an experienced tracker who has spent much of his life in the woods attuned to observing nature and animal signs. In the mid '80s he studied tracking with internationally renown, Tom Brown Jr., and in 1991 he founded Redtail Nature Awareness Camp near Scotsburn, offering wilderness experiences for children, youth and adults. Arsenault is a nature photographer and former attendee of Redtail Nature Awareness and has co-led programs with MacDonald for the past decade.

Please dress for the conditions, proper footwear is essential. If the snow pack continues snowshoes may also be necessary. Each week we will meet at the bridge on the MacBeth Road by Craig's Way at 12:50 pm.

Don's presentation will focus on an important topic we all know too well, **Atlantic Canada and the Costs of Climate Change: Making the Case for a National Flood Program**. He will also address how IBC's proposed plan will affect Atlantic Canadians when it comes to flood events.

Environment and Climate Change Canada is inviting you to comment on the proposed Recovery Strategy for Little Brown Myotis, Northern Myotis, and Tri-colored Bat in Canada.

These three bat species were listed as endangered by the federal *Species at Risk Act* (SARA) in November 2014. White-nose Syndrome, a disease specific to bats, has caused population declines that may be the most rapid of any species of mammal ever documented in North America.

On December 30, 2015, the proposed *Recovery Strategy for Little Brown Myotis, Northern Myotis, and Tricolored Bat in Canada* was posted on the Species at Risk Public Registry.

A recovery strategy is a planning document that identifies what needs to be done to stop or reverse the decline of a species. It sets population and distribution objectives and identifies the broad strategies and general approaches to meet them.

This document will remain on the registry for a 60-day comment period ending March 4, 2016.

After the public comment period of 60 days, Environment and Climate Change Canada will then review comments and integrate them as appropriate, after which the final version of the recovery strategy will be posted on the Species at Risk Public Registry.

Environment and Climate Change Canada is inviting you to comment on the Recovery Strategy for the Wood Turtle (Glyptemys insculpta) in Canada [proposed].

Wood Turtle is listed as Threatened under the federal Species at Risk Act. Although the Wood Turtle is strongly associated with year-round flowing streams, it is the most terrestrial of Canada's freshwater turtles. Road network and agricultural practices are the most serious threats to this species. Wood Turtle populations are highly vulnerable to any increases in mortality rates of adults or older juveniles because of the species' long-term reproductive success strategy (e.g., delayed sexual maturity, slow reproductive rate).

The proposed Recovery Strategy is posted on the Species at Risk Public Registry. A recovery strategy is a planning document that identifies what needs to be done to stop or reverse the decline of a species. It sets population and distribution objectives and identifies the broad strategies and general approaches to meet them. You can read the proposed Recovery Strategy and comment at:

After the public comment period ends on April 1, 2016, Environment and Climate Change Canada will review comments and integrate them as appropriate, after which the final version of the recovery strategy will be posted on the Species at Risk Public Registry.

Since 2013, all worn or unusable textiles and fabrics of any material and in any condition (except chemically contaminated) can be reused/recycled. Collection sites are all over HRM and Nova Scotia. AFTeR began in 2013 as a group of six organizations that collect used clothing to fund social causes such as helping children at risk, combatting disease, and supporting marginalized citizens and those facing crisis. This is accomplished with the added benefit of keeping the textile materials out of our landfills. MODL is taking steps towards an incentivized remedial program for properties with straight pipes located between the mouth of the LaHave River and the Bridgewater town limit, but first provincial and federal funding needs to come through. Organizer for the Council of Canadian Director will take place at the Jan 26th Council Meeting at 6:30 pm. at the MODL office, 210 Aberdeen Road, Bridgewater.

The Blue Communities Project was developed by the Council of Canadians and calls on communities to adopt a water commons framework by:

- 1. Recognizing water as a human right.
- 2. Promoting publicly financed, owned and operated water and waste water services.
- 3. Banning the sale of bottled water in public facilities and at municipal events.

A water commons framework treats water as belonging to no one, and the responsibility of all. Because water is central to human activity, it must be governed by principles that allow for reasonable use, equal distribution and responsible treatment in order to preserve water for nature and future generations.

Thank you to the South Shore Chapter's devoted water campaigner, Charlene Morton, for her outstanding leadership.
