Mikmaki Water Walk 2016 will start with the Shubenacadie River Water Walk in Sipeknèkatik District of Mikmaki on May 14, 2016 - May 21, 2016 - 9:00am - 5:00p daily. We will begin with ceremony for the water, at the mouth of the Shubenacadie River in Maitland at 9:00am at the River Runners river rafting lodge next to Dawson Dowell Park at 8681 Route 215, Maitland, NS. We will be completing the Shubie River Water walk on May 21st, at 4pm at the Shubenacadie Grand Lake at Oakfield Park. We will be stopping in Shubie at Indian School Road for a talking circle and sharing, and for water ceremony at Fort Ellis, where the Salt Brine waste discharge site is on the Shubie River estuary. Molly Peters has been given a 350 yr old copper pail for the Water Walk that we will carry for this Sacred Water walk. We will need a core group of women committed to carry the water and an Eagle staff carrier, someone to drive support vehicle and a communications person to post activities. Tshirts are being sold to raise funds for this walk and help with the next Water Walk in Mikmaki.

The Government of Canada is committed to working with interested parties to ensure that species at risk are protected. The *Species at Risk Act* supports this commitment by providing the public with an opportunity to comment on proposed recovery documents.

Environment and Climate Change Canada is inviting you to comment on the Management Plan for the Snapping Turtle (*Chelydra serpentina*) in Canada [proposed].

The Snapping Turtle is listed as Special Concern under Schedule 1 of the federal *Species at Risk Act* (SARA). It is one of the largest freshwater turtles in Canada. Snapping Turtles occupy a wide range of habitats but prefer aquatic habitats characterized by slow-moving water with a soft muddy bottom and dense aquatic vegetation. They also use adjacent terrestrial habitats. The main threats to the Canadian population of Snapping Turtles are conversion of aquatic or riparian habitats for agriculture and urban development purposes incompatible with the species' needs, the road network, legal and illegal harvesting, persecution, human-subsidized predators, and fishing bycatch. It should be noted that each of these threats has a cumulative effect.

The proposed management plan is posted on the Species at Risk Public Registry. A management plan is a planning document that sets goals and objectives for maintaining sustainable population levels of one or more species that are particularly sensitive to environmental factors, but which are not yet considered in danger of becoming extinct. After the public comment period ends on **May 29, 2016**, Environment and Climate Change Canada will review comments and integrate them as appropriate, after which the final version of the management plan will be posted on the Species at Risk Public Registry.

It isn't. Surprised? Don't be. Unless you read the proclamations website you'd never know. Sure a bill passed back on November 14 2014, but it was never proclaimed. Without proclamation a bill isn't law.

I was Minister of Energy and introduced Bill 6 as an amendment to the Petroleum Resources Act. Its intent was to place a moratorium on high volume fracking until and unless there was a time issues such as the Duty to Consult with First Nations, resource mapping, disposal of fracking wastewater, and defining and achieving community consent had been achieved.

But that bill is not law. Further, best I can tell, none of those issues are even being discussed or worked on (at least not publicly as promised). I spoke to contacts in both the Department of Energy this morning and the Legislative Counsel's office, and indeed, the moratorium is NOT the law of the land. Bill 6 was based on a commitment of trust, and it hasn't been followed through with.

The government might suggest the regulations are not done and so they have not proclaimed the bill. There are a many issues with this argument. First, even if that were true it still means the bill hasn't been proclaimed and

isn't law. Second, it doesn't appear the bill needs to have the regulations in place to be proclaimed, at least in part. Third, and perhaps most important, the regulations were supposed to be posted for 30 days of public comment in late January 2015. Nova Scotians are still waiting.

While I have to be careful not to cross the line of cabinet confidentiality, I can say that when I was minister I'd never have even brought the bill forward, or made a commitment about when regulations would be done without the support and agreement of staff, and without being fully confident that staff had presented 90% of what the regulations would entail. So you can guess there was little left to finish to have draft regulations out in time.

When I introduced the bill, I tabled definitions from other jurisdictions for High Volume Hydraulic Fracturing which were similar to what was to be proposed for regulations in Nova Scotia. There are a lot in scholarly articles and legislation (not none as some have tried to suggest) There was and remains no reason for the delay to bring forward regulations and no excuse not to have proclaimed the bill. Industry deserves the information. Environmental organizations deserve the information. Nova Scotians deserve the information.

Whether you agree with fracking or not, the fact the bill has not been proclaimed and regulations are over a year overdue should be of deep concern. Energy discussions have to be done on the basis of trust with all parties. Without a gun to the head. Challenges with projects such as pipelines and the Alton Gas project have resulted in part because of lack of open discussion sufficiently in advance of projects. Knowing this, it has to make you wonder what the current priorities are in the Department of Energy.

Despite claims by some that if Nova Scotia allowed fracking there would suddenly be lots of jobs and oil and gas would flow everywhere, that doesn't seem likely. In the current economic climate exploration programs are being scaled back, onshore exploration in areas which have previously shown little success are not top priorities. Even the Wheeler Report commissioned by the province suggested that under best case scenario if gas was found, it would be decades for the industry to take hold. But that also makes it the right time to have the discussions with communities and all stakeholders to decide the future on these issues. It's the right time to address the requirements to meet the Duty to Consult with First Nations. It's the right time to determine what constitutes Community Consent. Communities deserve to know if we are even talking about something real. The Department of Energy promised to produce a detailed atlas and yet nothing has been heard. Many of the areas of interest for exploration conflict with significant and important agricultural areas (some of which could not be subject to fugitive air emissions). There is little agreement with stakeholders about how those conflicts would be resolved.

To date, something like 169 conventional and unconventional wells have been drilled in Nova Scotia, some of them fracked. All failed to find commercial quantities of oil and gas. The sole exception is East Coast Energy's Coal Gas Methane project (which does not involve fracking) in the Stellarton area which is currently progressing. So maybe this is a debate about nothing, but it still means the province must follow through on it's commitments to both sides in this debate.

How can we ever expect industry, environmentalists, First Nations, and the many other stakeholders to work together if the commitments by government are not lived up to.

Bill 6 was a promise. It was a promise that regulations and proclamation would come quickly, and there would be a period of public comment. With over 60% of Nova Scotians against fracking and only about a quarter in favour at the time of the bill, it made sense to take the pressure out of the situation and step back, whether that ended up being permanently or just temporarily.

The resources (if they exist) belong to Nova Scotians so Nova Scotians need to make the decisions. Without even proclaiming the law, the trust that bill was based on, and one of the key elements of social license, has already been broken.

For those that want to frack the law isn't the law at this point, and there seems to be no legal moratorium in place in Nova Scotia (it had been argued that the previous policy moratorium of the NDP was also not legally enforceable).

Halifax MP to introduce private members' motion proposing greenhouse gas emissions analyses of government's infrastructure projects

4 May 2016, Halifax NS

Andy Fillmore, Member of Parliament for Halifax, will introduce a private members' motion in the House of Commons on Thursday that will increase evidence-based decision making in infrastructure spending and foster environmental responsibility in government.

The motion proposes greenhouse gas emissions analyses be undertaken for infrastructure proposals seeking federal funding. It further proposes that funding priority be given, where appropriate, to infrastructure proposals that help to mitigate the impacts of climate change.

"As one of Canada's primary coastal cities, Halifax stands on the front lines in the battle against climate change. The impact of greenhouse gas emissions, if not curbed, will have serious repercussions for Halifax, for Nova Scotia, and for the communities that we love," Mr. Fillmore said.

"Having GHG emissions analyses completed on infrastructure proposals will allow government to make informed decisions when making funding choices, and it will help us track progress toward our GHG reduction goals," said Mr. Fillmore. "It will foster a culture of environmental consciousness in government – one where environmental costs and consequences are front of mind in all of its decision making."

"This government is going to be building bridges, roads, community centres," continued Mr. Fillmore. "We need to ensure we are accounting for their environmental impact, and consider building infrastructure with particular methods and materials that will mitigate the impacts of climate change."

Elizabeth May and the Green Party of N.S. and Canada are calling on the province and its Atlantic neighbours to set stronger climate targets and aggressively grow renewable energy.

Federal Green Party leader May, who was in Halifax Saturday to attend the launch of the N.S. Greens' leadership race, also condemned the planned reopening of the Donkin mine.

"Nova Scotians, like all Canadians, could be leading the country in embracing the 21st-century economy, where clean tech jobs and renewable energy drives growth," said May, who was joined by interim N.S. Green leader Brynn Nheiley and independent MLA Andrew Younger.

She further called on neighbouring provinces to work together by investing in renewable energy infrastructure and building a decentralized power network.

"Embracing 21st-century renewable energy will keep Nova Scotians employed for generations to come," said May.

Younger is tabling a bill in the legislature on Monday calling on Nova Scotia to take full advantage of last year's Paris Agreement on tackling climate change.

His bill calls for greenhouse gas emission reduction targets to be set, for a maximizing of employment in green industries, and an estimate of costs and savings for Nova Scotians, among other items.

"Nova Scotia is better positioned than many jurisdictions to take advantage of jobs in the green energy sector," said Younger.

As the Nova Scotia Nature Trust nears completion of its landmark **100 Wild Islands** conservation campaign, exciting news may be coming. Tonight, Councillor David Hendsbee is asking Halifax for \$300,000 to bring the Nature Trust's \$7 million fundraising campaign to the finish line. Halifax will be home to what has been described as Nova Scotia's most significant yet least-known natural treasure. Nestled between Clam Harbour Beach and Taylor Head, just over an hour from downtown, the 100 Wild Islands is a vast, wild archipelago of beautiful, unspoiled coastal islands. It is home to pristine white sandy beaches and idyllic clear blue lagoons, dramatic headlands and cliffs, and ecologically rich wetlands and even rainforest. Once complete, the 100 Wild Islands coastal wilderness will stretch 30km along the coast, encompassing over 280 islands, hundreds of kilometres of shoreline, 430 acres of wetlands, and rich diversity of wildlife.

Grand opening of Lakeview Trail opens up Long Lake Provincial Park

APRIL 22 (Halifax, NS) – Today (Earth Day), more Haligonians and visitors will be able to access the beauty and adventure of Long Lake Provincial Park, thanks to new Lakeview Trail. Trail entrance and parking lot are located at Northwest Arm Drive and Cowie Hill Road, across from Long Lake Village subdivision.

Long Lake Village developers Polycorp and Atlantic Developments built the new trail, which is almost 5 km long, to welcome walkers, bikers, and strollers. The new trail links many of the rugged footpaths that run through the northeast portion of Long Lake Provincial Park. The new trail and parking lot are a Polycorp and Atlantic Developments initiative, featuring parking for 60 vehicles, benches, washroom facilities, garbage cans and doggie bags.

"Long Lake Provincial Park is beautiful greenspace in the middle of our city, but it's been largely inaccessible," says David Graham, President of Atlantic Developments. He adds: "Peter Polley recognized a wonderful

opportunity to provide access to the park, through a private-public partnership. We are happy to have built the parking lot and trail and to contribute to making this park more accessible to everyone."

Lakeview Trail is longer than the outside loop of Point Pleasant Park. Long Lake Provincial Park covers over 2,000 hectares, or 5,000 acres, which is five times the size of New York City's Central Park. A team of dedicated local volunteers has formed the Long Lake Provincial Park Association, which will manage and maintain trail operations.

A ribbon cutting will take place at 1:30 pm at the Lakeview trailhead, and will oversee the start of a community run with the Cunard Junior High track team.

Long Lake Village is a newly developed neighbourhood of townhouses, single family homes and soon to be Condos, founded on the theme of "Play". It will be a community where people of all fitness levels can walk, run, bike, swim, kayak, canoe, paddle board, windsurf, play on a modern playground set, and utilize the Hadley Crescent playing field for picnics and games. Ideal for young families, expect to see the occasional street hockey game on Hadley Crescent, named after Hadley MacDonald, grandfather of Atlantic Developments' President, David Graham.
