The Halifax Regional Municipality is conducting the third and final phase of public engagement for the Halifax Green

Network Plan, a decision-making framework for the conservation of a region-wide network of open space. A number of planning and implementation directions have been drafted using public input and study results from the earlier phases of work and are contained in the newly released Halifax Green Network Plan Primer Report. More information on the Halifax Green Network Plan is available online at <u>www.halifax.ca/HalifaxGreenNetwork</u>.

Public engagement for this phase will be launched with a series of public meetings across HRM and online engagement. Input from the public will help refine the planning directions and develop more detailed recommendations and actions for the final Plan. Once approved, the Halifax Green Network Plan will guide the Municipality and landowners in determining where and how open space should be conserved for multiple environmental, social, cultural and economic benefits including:

- Ecosystems & Biodiversity
- Working Landscapes
- Recreation and Trails
- Community Shaping, and
- Cultural Landscapes

The public meetings across the Region start next week in Dartmouth and will include a presentation of the work to date followed by a Q&A period and interactive open house session.

Hybrid, multi-site course on ecosystem approaches to health

May-June 2017

Are you preoccupied by complex issues influencing the health of ecosystems, communities, humans and/or animals? Discover innovative and dynamic approaches for better understanding the multiple factors which influence health – ecosystem approaches to health – with an experienced, pan-Canadian team. During this intensive course you will learn methods for carrying out research and interventions on issues at the confluence of health, the environment and society. This part online, part face-to-face graduate level course on ecosystem approaches to health is being offered at four sites: INRS-Institut Armand-Frappier, University of Guelph, University of Northern British Columbia and University of Toronto. About half of the time (8-9 sessions) will be conducted as simultaneous webinars and about half of the time (face to face time plus field trips) will be locally run sessions.

This course is available to graduate students from all disciplines and also to professionals interested in these themes. We offer a rigorous, hands-on pedagogical approach, illustrated through a case study, focused on "the role of universities in their watersheds."

Re. Small Hive Beetle -- these hive pests harass the bees, and their maggots slime the honey, thus ruining it. Small-scale beekeepers such as ourselves will be the most negatively impacted by the introduction of the beetle.

The existing highway section to be upgraded and twinned is approximately 9.5 kilometers. The project also includes upgrading of an existing tidal gate structure (aboiteau) at the Avon River causeway. Detailed design of the project is expected to be completed in 2018 but some construction could be initiated in the fall of 2017. It is anticipated that construction will take approximately five years.

Statement in response to the Report of the Consultation Panel on the Political Activities of Charities

May 5, 2017

Sierra Club Canada Foundation is gratified to see changes recommended by the *Report of the Consultation Panel on the Political Activities of Charities* <u>released</u> May 4 and applauds the Minister of National Revenue for acting immediately on the Consultation Panel's recommendation to <u>suspend political activity audits</u> that placed the charitable status of certain groups at risk.

"As an organisation that was targeted by a political activity audit and one that works tirelessly to protect the environment through non-partisan policy dialogue and on-the-ground programs, we hope the government will act in the upcoming session of Parliament to implement legislative change in response to the panel's recommendations," stated Gretchen Fitzgerald, National Program Director of Sierra Club Canada Foundation. "I want to thank our supporters and donors who took action to protect freedom of speech and participated in the Panel consultations," she added.

The Consultation Panel report states: "The legislative framework for regulating charities in Canada is out-dated and overly restrictive." and recommends legislative change to enable charities to fully participate in public policy debates occurring within the areas charitable work.

The Panel made the following four specific and time-sensitive recommendations including changes to the Income Tax Act (ITA):

"1. Revise the CRA's administrative position and policy (including its policy guidance, CPS -022 Political Activities) to enable charities to fully engage in public policy dialogue and development.

2. Implement changes to the CRA's administration of the ITA in the following areas: compliance and appeals, audits, and communication and collaboration to enhance clarity and consistency.

3. Amend the ITA by deleting any reference to non-partisan "political activities" to explicitly allow charities to fully engage, without limitation, in non-partisan public policy dialogue and development, provided that it is subordinate to and furthers their charitable purposes.

4. Modernize the legislative framework governing the charitable sector (ITA) to ensure a focus on charitable purposes rather than activities, and adopt an inclusive list of acceptable charitable purposes to reflect current social and environmental issues and approaches."

The Panel report concludes: "It is the view of the Panel that the characterisation of what constitutes "political activities", and the limitations imposed on charities in this regard, impede the sector's participation in public policy dialogue and development, and do a disservice to Canadians, while offering no offsetting regulatory benefit. " and calls for immediate policy changes (to be implemented by Dec. 31, 2017) and legislative changes limiting participation of charities in policy dialogue and development to be lifted by April 1, 2018.

"There was wide-spread consensus from Canadians and <u>Civil Society</u> who participated in this process that change is needed to improve the law for charities in this country for the benefit of us all," according to Sierra Club Canada Foundation President, David Snider, "The Consultation Panel made it clear that the rules for charities in Canada are outdated and do not reflect the expectations of Canadians who support these charities that the sector get to the root causes of problems facing society - problems that often require policy change to be fixed."
