Every Wednesday afternoon (1-3 pm) in July (19, 26) and August (2, 9, 16, 23, 30) the Harrison Lewis Centre hosts Wild Wednesday guided nature walks at neighbouring Thomas Raddall Provincial Park.

Tar Sands in the Bay of Fundy - Energy East Information Tour

The Ecology Action Centre (EAC) is hosting a series of information sessions in coastal Nova Scotian communities along the Bay of Fundy to discuss risks of the Tar Sands Supertankers to the Bay of Fundy – proposed as part of the Energy East Pipeline project.

The EAC's information sessions, (dates and locations listed below) are a chance to discuss details and risks of these Tar Sands Supertankers and the Energy East Pipeline. The sessions aim to hear feedback and concerns from coastal communities about the project, and begin to work together to stop Tar Sands Supertankers in the Bay of Fundy. TransCanada's Energy East pipeline and associated export terminal in Saint John, New Brunswick pose risks to the entire Bay of Fundy due to associated marine terminal and increased tanker traffic in the Bay of Fundy and through the Gulf of Maine. Tanker traffic would increase by nearly290 tankers per year, adding 330 million barrels of diluted bitumen to the annual tanker traffic in the area. This could impact coastal communities, fisheries, and much of Nova Scotia's mainland coastline.

Last week, the government announced that they had approved the tire burning pilot project, marking a shift in this province from recycling tires to burning them, and going against the clear decision made by government in 2007 not to allow burning.

The Ecology Action Centre is deeply concerned with this decision, particularly given that it was reached without conducting a GHG life cycle assessment of burning tires vs. recycling them. In a press release on Friday, we asked the government to, at very minimum, suspend the decision until they have done a life cycle assessment.

No one who keeps an eye on the Nova Scotia energy scene was surprised to learn that EnCana plans to halt production at its ill-starred Deep Panuke offshore gas development in two to three years.

Not only was the project 10 years late and a billion dollars over budget, water problems have plagued it, reducing production to the winter months only, when prices are highest. But the timing of EnCana's decision also coincides with the planned shutdown of five steadily producing gas fields off Sable Island operated by ExxonMobil that have generated \$2

Sierra Club Canada Foundation says no to oil and gas in a Marine Protected Area.

Ottawa - Sierra Club Canada Foundation is deeply alarmed with the recent announcement by the Government of Canada to consider allowing oil and gas activities in 80% of the Laurentian Channel MPA. National Program Director Gretchen Fitzgerald says, "It violates the spirit and the definition of what exactly a Marine Protected Area is – an area that due to the types of species and its ecological significance, requires protection as set out in the *Ocean's Act*.

Fitzgerald continues: "It means – in practice and not just on paper - that marine life are shielded from the very industrial activity they would now consider allowing to occur. Permitting oil and gas exploration in this area doesn't make any sense. It is the exact opposite of "protecting."

"Impacts of oil and gas are hardly "negligible" as the government <u>contends</u> in announcing this so-called MPA. It's bad enough that noise from seismic blasting travels hundreds of kilometres through the ocean, so conducting seismic around an MPA, never mind within it, should be restricted. New research is showing seismic airguns <u>blast a "hole" in plankton</u>, the basis of the marine food chain, that reaches for over a kilometre from the source." she adds.

Additionally, Sierra Club Canada Foundation believes that the Government of Canada is playing fast and loose with their own agenda. "On June 23, the government released their announcement of its intention to declare this exact area as a Marine Protected Area, noting themselves that doing so will help them to fulfill their promise to the public to protect ecologically significant areas. Fitzgerald notes, "Creating a Marine Protected Area is not a box you can simply check off and think you have satisfied your obligations, and then turn around days later and declare that same area may be up for grabs by the oil and gas industry. Canadians know better, and Canadians expect better. In this case only one fifith of the area can truly 'count' toward our goal."

Sierra Club Canada Foundation is part of a coalition of groups currently going to court to challenge the Newfoundland government on precisely this type of activity in the Gulf of St. Lawrence. In a desperate fight to save the endangered blue whale, its habitat in the Gulf, and the marine chain of life it relies upon, the group is challenging a drilling licence given to Corridor Resources, a licence Fitzgerald explains, "that expired and should never have been re-issued. Our natural heritage is at stake here. The largest animal on the planet is on the verge of extinction in our own waters. As massive as these extraordinary whales are, they are some of the most fragile on earth."

I am writing to inform you that on Saturday, June 17, 2017, a proposal to amend Schedule 1 of the *Species at Risk Act* (SARA), was published in <u>Part I of the Canada Gazette for 31 species</u>.

This marks the beginning of a 30-day public comment period during which you can share your comments on the proposal either by responding to this email, writing to ec.lepreglementations-SARAregulations.ec@canada.ca or calling 1800.668-6767. The public comment period will end on Monday, July 17, 2017.

The Minister of the Environment and Climate Change will take into consideration comments and any additional information received following this publication and make a listing recommendation for each species to the Governor in Council (Cabinet). The Governor in Council will then make the final decision on whether to accept the assessments of these species and to amend Schedule 1 accordingly, not to add the species to Schedule 1 or to refer the matter back to the Committee on the Status of Endangered Wildlife in Canada (COSEWIC) for further information or to review.

- Updates to key priorities, including announcements in Budget 2017

We provided the <u>Government Response to the House of Commons Standing Committee</u> on Environment and Sustainable Development that shows:

• Progress in implementing the recommendations made in the Standing Committee's report <u>Federal Sustainability</u> for Future Generations-a Report Following an Assessment of the <u>Federal Sustainable Development Act</u>.

We tabled proposed amendments to the Federal Sustainable Development Act that:

- Expand the purpose and scope;
- Set a high bar for transparency, improved reporting, and oversight;
- Extend coverage to more than 90 federal departments and agencies; and,
- Continue the conversation on sustainability with Indigenous peoples and Canadians, respecting diversity-particularly youth-and gender parity.
