Training in the Wetland Ecosystem Service Protocol for Atlantic Canada (WESP-AC)

Presenter: Dr. Paul Adamus, Oregon State University

October 10th-11th 2017 8:30a.m. to 5 p.m. (includes lunch and snacks/coffee for both days)

Capacity is limited to approximately 25 people

WESP is a template for creating spreadsheet tools (standardised data forms and models) that rapidly assess the ecosystem services of wetlands, in support of environmental impact assessments and monitoring of restoration projects. A regionalised version of WESP was created and officially required for use in the Province of Alberta in 2014, as well as by the states of Oregon and (in part) Alaska. Regionalisation for the Maritime provinces, resulting in a tool called WESP-AC, began last year with development and calibration in New Brunswick, sponsored by NB ELG and Environment Canada. Extensions of that will be completed in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island this year.

This two day course on WESP-AC will be useful to environmental consultants and agency staff required to assess wetland functions and benefits, monitor restored wetlands, or conduct watershed assessments. The first day the creator of WESP will initially explain its origins, overall structure, and how it is being used elsewhere. He will conclude by explaining components of each of the models which automatically compute relative estimates of a wetland's importance for three hydrologic functions, four water quality functions, nine habitat functions, and carbon storage. We will assess approximately 4 wetlands over the two days. Please be prepared with field gear for rain or shine.

We've just launched the second annual <u>Great Canadian Bumble Bee Count</u>, running now until September 15th. Each submission before September 16th counts as one chance for a \$25 gift certificate to use on products from our friends at <u>Sustainable Outdoors Co.</u>

Canadian scientists need to know: where are the bees

And, well, there's just not enough scientists to do enough counting of bumble bees. They need committed individuals like you and me to take photos along with observations about the floral hosts, the weather and any other bees bumbling around.

Can we count on you as a Census-taker?

We've made taking part easy with our <u>Census Cards</u> that you can view on your smart phone or download and print to take with you. They show the colouring of female workers from many of the species – <u>one card for Western Canada's bumble</u> <u>bees</u> and <u>one for Eastern Canada</u>. If you see a bumble bee with a basket of pollen stuck to its leg – you'll know it's a female (worker) – the male (drones) don't collect pollen.

The Government of Canada wishes to inform you of an upcoming multi-stakeholder workshop regarding proposed regulations on formaldehyde emissions from composite wood products.

More information on this initiative can be found on the <u>Formaldehyde</u> webpage accessible on the Government of Canada website <u>https://www.canada.ca/en/health-canada/services/chemical-substances.html</u>.

Interested parties who wish to participate in this initiative may include stakeholders in the composite wood sector such as producers, importers, and companies who distribute/sell composite wood products. This may include hardwood plywood, medium-density fibreboard, particleboard, and laminated products as well as finished goods made from these composite wood products. Other interested stakeholders may include non-governmental organizations; Indigenous peoples; labour organizations; provincial and territorial governments.

On July 31, 2017, the Government of Canada published a consultation document to inform stakeholders and solicit comments on the proposed regulatory approach. The consultation document can be found at http://www.ec.gc.ca/lcpe-cepa/default.asp?lang=En&n=00B2F79C-1. Comments on this consultation document are welcome until September 1, 2017 [30 days after its date of publication]. Information on how to submit comments relating to this consultation document is provided below.

The multi-stakeholder workshop is the next step in the consultation process which was launched after publication of the Notice of Intent on March 18, 2017 in the <u>Canada Gazette, Part I</u>. This is further to the initial webinars which were held on April 5 and April 19, 2017. The workshop will provide interested parties with an overview of the initiative and will solicit input to inform the development of the proposed regulations which are intended to be published in 2018.

The workshop will be held on September 6, 2017 in Ottawa, Ontario and will also be accessible through WebEx. Interested parties must submit their interest in participating in the workshop by August 16, 2017. Interested parties are invited to participate in a short online questionnaire to help inform the workshop agenda and focus the discussions. The Nature Writing and Art Contest is inviting youth in ages 7-15 years who live in Nova Scotia to submit a **written piece** (short story, non-fiction, poetry, etc.) **OR** an **original artwork** (painting, drawing, collage, etc.) that is inspired by: native plants or animals of Nova Scotia (*native means a species that occurs naturally in a region*),

an adventure, personal moment, or happy experience in Nova Scotia's wild places (lake, river, ocean, forest, trail), an injustice that impacts nature in Nova Scotia

Rules and Regulations:

This contest is open to youth in ages 7-15 who live in Nova Scotia.

Students may enter as many times as they wish; however, each youth will be limited to one prize per contest.

Writing Category specifications

Entries can be in French, English or Mi'kmaw and be a maximum of 600 words

Entries may be in any form (short story, non-fiction, poetry, etc.)

It is advisable written work be accompanied by a photo or artwork that supports the subject

Entries must include a title page with the author's name – do not put author's name on manuscript pages to ensure anonymous judging

Entries must be original, written by the author, have been written in 2017 and not previously published

Art Category specifications

Wildlife species (plants and animals) and or habitat represented in artwork must be native to Nova Scotia – exotic or domestic animals and plants will not be accepted.

All formats and mediums are accepted (except photographs): drawing, painting, collage, fibre arts, sculpture etc. All art entries must be made by hand. Photographs and computer-generated artwork will not be accepted

Sobey Family Protects Land on the St. Mary's River: Nova Scotia Nature Trust's Conservation Legacy Grows

Sherbrooke, NS (August 15, 2017) – At a special public celebration in Sherbrooke on Saturday, David and Faye Sobey entrusted their 30 acre property on the St. Mary's River to the care of the Nova Scotia Nature Trust. The property provides critical habitat for several endangered species but is also steeped in memories for the Sobey family who have been visiting this part of the river for over 80 years.

The property builds on long-time Nature Trust conservation work on the St. Mary's river, one of Nova Scotia's most ecologically rich and important rivers. The new property brings their conservation network to nine protected areas encompassing over 800 acres of important forests and wetlands on this river.

The Sobey property at Mitchells Pool, just north of Sherbrook Village, includes 30 acres beautiful floodplain forest, a rare ecosystem in Nova Scotia. Its large oaks, maples, and yellow birch provide cooling shade essential for the rivers aquatic life. The property's stillwater, brooks, swamp and island provide important habitat for a diversity of wildlife, from ducks and forest birds to amphibians and reptiles including wood turtles, a species on Canada's endangered species list.

The Nature Trust's Executive Director, Bonnie Sutherland, noted, "David and Faye Sobeys' generous gift of land on the St. Mary's is a significant conservation achievement. It protects some of the last intact, mature floodplain forest in the province, and critical habitat for endangered birds and turtles."

Over the years, the Sobeys took note as friends and neighbours on the river took action to protect their lands through the Nature Trust, including late Sandy and Shirley Cameron.

Wanting to ensure the Mitchell's Pool lands were kept pristine, and recognizing the importance of intact forests for the river's health, the Sobeys decided donate their land to the Nature Trust.

But their motivation went beyond conservation. Like so many Nova Scotians, the Sobeys have a deep connection to the land, steeped in precious family memories. David Sobey began visiting the river with his family as a young boy and the river grew to be a significant part of his life.

"In the late 1930s my father began taking my older brother Bill and I and my younger brother Donald, down to the St. Mary's River," Mr. Sobey noted. "As a youngster, at college, this was a great place for my buddies and me to come. And way back in 1953, Faye and I had even our honeymoon here at Mitchells Pool. And we've kept coming down here over the years with our family. So, the river has always been a part of my life."

Ms. Sutherland noted that while the Nature Trust's work is based on and driven by conservation science, "The real magic comes from the people we work with and their connection to these special places. It has been such a joy to work with Mr. Sobey to preserve this treasured place, so close to his heart."

Many landowners who partner with the Nature Trust are concerned about the future of their land and inspired by the Nature Trust's potential role as a steward of the lands they love.

Mr. Sobey noted, "It's not just my time as the caretaker of the land that matters, or my son Paul's time—it's in perpetuity. And I feel that the property is in good hands with the Nature Trust. They are committed to looking after it, forever. And they've certainly shown they can look after these properties."

At a community event celebrating the Sobeys' conservation gift on the weekend, Ms. Sutherland noted, "What a wonderful contribution David and Faye Sobey have made to protecting Nova Scotia's natural legacy and the legacy of the St. Mary's River. They have preserved a special place where future generations can come to enjoy and experience that same wonder that captured David Sobeys heart when he was just a boy."

The River has a rich human history, once famous as an Atlantic Salmon river, and is loved by many, locals and visitors alike, as an iconic scenic, recreational and wilderness treasure. The local community has been actively working for years to restore and protect the watershed and its fish populations through the St. Mary's River Association, and welcomed news of a new protected area on the river.

Asked about what he hopes for the property, Mr. Sobey replied, "The Mitchells Pool lands are going to be a part of Nova Scotia that keeps its natural beauty forever. I hope that my children and grandchildren and other people too, will enjoy visiting this land like I have since I was just a young fella."

The Nature Trust's conservation work on the St. Mary's River, and protecting Nova Scotia's freshwater and endangered species legacy, is generously supported by many individuals and organizations. Major supporters include the Nova Scotia Crown Share Land Legacy Trust, the David and Faye Sobey Foundation, Environment and Climate Change Canada and the Marguerite Hubbard Charitable Foundation. Last week, the government announced that they had approved the tire burning pilot project, marking a shift in this province from recycling tires to burning them, and going against the clear decision made by government in 2007 not to allow burning.

The Ecology Action Centre is deeply concerned with this decision, particularly given that it was reached without conducting a GHG life cycle assessment of burning tires vs. recycling them. In a press release on Friday, we asked the government to, at very minimum, suspend the decision until they have done a life cycle assessment.

No one who keeps an eye on the Nova Scotia energy scene was surprised to learn that EnCana plans to halt production at its ill-starred Deep Panuke offshore gas development in two to three years.

Not only was the project 10 years late and a billion dollars over budget, water problems have plagued it, reducing production to the winter months only, when prices are highest. But the timing of EnCana's decision also coincides with the planned shutdown of five steadily producing gas fields off Sable Island operated by ExxonMobil that have generated \$2 billion in royalties for the province. This effectively puts an end to a local source of natural gas that's been available for 20 years.

Federal Sustainable Development Strategy (FSDS) News

It's been an exciting week for sustainable development in Canada. We released the <u>Spring 2017 update</u> to the 2016–2019 FSDS with:

- Results for short-term milestones
- Updates to key priorities, including announcements in Budget 2017

We provided the <u>Government Response to the House of Commons Standing Committee</u> on Environment and Sustainable **Development** that shows:

• Progress in implementing the recommendations made in the Standing Committee's report <u>Federal Sustainability</u> for Future Generations-a Report Following an Assessment of the *Federal Sustainable Development Act*.

We tabled proposed amendments to the Federal Sustainable Development Act that:

- Expand the purpose and scope;
- Set a high bar for transparency, improved reporting, and oversight;
- Extend coverage to more than 90 federal departments and agencies; and,
- Continue the conversation on sustainability with Indigenous peoples and Canadians, respecting diversityparticularly youth-and gender parity.

Read the <u>Government Response</u> and <u>proposed amendments to the Act</u> to see how they respond to the Standing Committee's report that received unanimous support.
