Join us on the adventure of a lifetime!

The Nature Trust is seeking adventurers to join us and for the third Expedition for the Earth to Ecuador from September 22-29, 2018!

This incredible adventure will take you to one of the world's biodiversity hotspots. You will visit the cloud forests, upper Amazon basin, volcanoes and Andean peaks of northern Ecuador on this fully-guided 8 day trek.

The goal of the Expedition for the Earth is to raise critical funds and awareness to support the conservation of special places in Nova Scotia while exploring incredible protected places around the world.

Internationally renowned mountaineer Wally Berg of Berg Adventures International will expertly guide the trek. Wally has extensive experience guiding international adventures and has led countless expeditions around the world including to the seven summits. In addition, Berg has partnered with the Nature Trust on the previous two Expedition for the Earth treks to Patagonia in 2013 and Iceland in 2016, which raised over \$100,000 for conservation in Nova Scotia.

The Adventure

The adventure will begin in Quito. From there you will travel to the Upper Amazon basin and spend the next several days exploring the cloud forests and lush Amazon basin of the Cayambe Coca Ecological Reserve. After that you will travel north to Otavalo where you will hike the spectacular Guinea Pig Lake in the Cotacachi-Cyapas Ecological Reserve, and climb to the summit of Fuya Fuya. For every part of your journey you will be joined by local naturalists who will provide fascinating insights into the local protected areas, and the incredible flora and fauna of the region.

We are in a time of transition. Our working hypothesis is that a major component of this transition will be a change from growth-dependent economics to zero-growth or cyclical economics. The goal of Virtuous Cycle Investment is to identify and invest in tools and strategies that will remain valuable after this transition runs its course.

By creating alternatives for smart capital and talent, we hope to provide a low-friction vehicle for preserving the gains made in the industrial age as the chaotic transition to the next one takes place. Our current approach is to provide mentorship, workspace, a legal framework and co-investment opportunities to partners who believe they have a project that would align with these goals. Our current areas of research are in land transformation, self-organization and machine learning, but we are interested in all proposals.

All across the country we are seeing tremendous energy and enthusiasm around the growing sophistication of **community-based water monitoring (CBWM)**, its significant contributions to freshwater assessment, and its potential to realize collaborative models of watershed governance. We are learning from regional dialogues within the water community and across sectors that there is a need to help direct the momentum building around CBWM at the national level.

The question is, given the geographical diversity of our country and the context-specific nature of CBWM initiatives, how will this be possible? Your perspective will be helpful in answering this question.

The Gordon Foundation, Living Lakes Canada and WWF have collaborated on an online Priority Setting Survey, part of a broader initiative to understand how to best support CBWM and the use of community-generated data at multiple scales of decision-making. The overall aim is to identify gaps and strategic opportunities to support CBWM at the federal level. This seven-minute survey involves open- and closed-ended questions. It will be available from November 25th – December 15th, 2017 and results will be shared with you via email in January 2018.

The Atlantic Council for International Cooperation is delighted to share that Global Affairs has just launched a call for proposals - **2017 Call for Preliminary Proposals - Development Impact Window - Canadian Small and Medium Organizations (SMO) for Impact and Innovation.** This is part of the \$100M SMO Fund that Minister Bibeau announced on May 9, 2017. This is the first and largest component of the fund. There will also be an Innovation Fund and a Capacity Building component with details to be announced at a later date.

Through this call, the Government of Canada acknowledges the important role Small and Medium Sized Organizations play in the achievement of Canada's Feminist International Development Aid Policy. This call is, in part, a result of a multi-year advocacy campaign by the Inter-Council Network of Provincial and Regional Councils, to ensure the Government of Canada values the strength and diversity of SMOs rooted in communities across Canada from coast to coast to coast.

<u>2017 Call for Preliminary Proposals - Development Impact Window - Canadian Small and Medium Organizations for Impact and Innovation</u>

Deadline for submitting a preliminary proposal for this call: **December 21, 2017 before 12 p.m.** (noon) Eastern Standard Time.

Global Affairs requires an <u>attestation</u> signed by your organization's financial director or president indicating that your organization is a Canadian small or medium organization according to the following definition for this call for preliminary proposals: the **consolidated revenue in your organization's financial statements is equal to or less than \$10 million** (this limitation does not apply to educational institutions) and your organization does not have **annual overseas expenditures exceeding \$2 million in development assistance** (i.e. projects administered with the promotion of the economic development and welfare of developing countries as their main objective (regardless of the funding source)). If your organization is submitting a proposal on behalf of a group of organizations, each organization must be a Canadian SMO as per the definition above for this call and must provide the requisite Canadian Small or Medium Organization Attestation. You must scan the attestations together into one single document and submit it as part of the application package.

SOIL links Canadian farmers willing to take on and train apprentices with people who want to work and learn on an organic farm using sustainable practices. The 2017/18 'apprentice seeking season' is gathering steam and it's a good time to put your applications in. We have farmer hosts all across Canada and have been providing this service since 1989. Apprenticeships are available to anyone over 18 years old who is healthy, self motivated and eager to learn. A time commitment of eight weeks is usually required. A full-season commitment is usually preferred. Typically, apprenticeships take place between May and September, although many farms need help all year round. Most apprenticeships involve labor in exchange for room, board and the opportunity to learn, although some farms provide a wage or small allowance. Organization: St Martha's Garden

Location: Antigonish, Nova Scotia (if you are from out of the area, we will do our best to help you find a place to live nearby) The St Martha's New Grower Program is seeking applicants who want to pursue gardening as a career. The garden is set up with raised beds, irrigation, deer fence, and greenhouses. It is mostly managed with plastic tarps and landscape fabric on raised beds for weed control. Beginning this year, we plan to have an additional acre in mechanically cultivated row crops. Total area in production is two acres.

A unique aspect of this program is it is mostly self-driven, with mentorship support.

A barn near the garden houses many tools, including a BCS walking tractor and implements. There is also a walk in cooler and a vegetable processing area. High quality compost, cover crop seed, electricity and water are included. Mentorship from two experienced market gardeners is a key component of this educational program.

Each participant pays a fee of \$4,000 or 50% of gross sales, whichever is less. Participants also purchase seeds, fuel and other consumables. In 2017 two people working full time had total gross sales of \$40,000 on one acre. Knowledge, hard work and weather in the growing season are factors that determine what income can be made. Applicants should be able to support themselves financially until harvests from the garden exceed startup expenses. It is also helpful to have access to

a vehicle for transporting produce to market.

If you are in transition between apprenticing on farms and starting your own market garden, or if you have some experience growing vegetables and need to learn all aspects of market gardening this is a perfect learning opportunity for you. If you are from out of the area, we will do our best to help you find a place to live nearby. The Bethany Garden is located right in the dynamic town of Antigonish, Nova Scotia, home of St Francis Xavier University.

"Northern Pulp wants author Joan Baxter and her latest book placed squarely on the Christmas naughty list," reports Francis Campbell for the Chronicle Herald http://thechronicleherald.ca/novascotia/1526447-author-upset-northern-pulp-book-signing-cancelled:

Baxter was looking forward to signing copies of The Mill: Fifty Years of Pulp and Protest at Coles in New Glasgow on Saturday afternoon.

But the event was cancelled after an apparent attempt by the company that runs the Abercrombie Point Mill in Pictou County to scuttle the book-signing.

"In my opinion, this book is a non-factual rhetoric-filled account of the mill and its history and, quite frankly, something that is offensive to anyone who has an association to the mill," company communications director Kathy Cloutier wrote in an email that was dispersed to Northern Pulp employees and forwarded to retired mill workers.

Remarkably, Coles cancelled a scheduled the signing for The Mill.

A 'cautious approach' in Nova Scotia, says lain Rankin https://www.nationalobserver.com/2017/11/27/news/trudeau-government-introduce-new-law-2018-make-polluters-pay

Hailing from Nova Scotia, Iain Rankin is another newly-minted environment minister who recently took over his portfolio and discussed the possibility of bringing his province into the carbon market. Nova Scotia has already introduced its own cap and trade legislation, and is now deciding whether to link it with the larger market.

"We made our legislation specifically to be flexible in case we do want to link... so we're taking that cautious approach as we develop our regulations, so indeed that would be an option," Rankin told National Observer.

"Nova Scotia has been a leader in reducing greenhouse gases. we've already reduced by the target, which is 30 per cent from 2005 levels and that's primarily due to a hard cap that we have in our electricity sector. But our cap and trade system will complement that policy and we'll be able to drive emissions down further."

Nova Scotia remains one of four provinces in Canada still seeking to phase out its coal-fired power plants. It plans to do this, Rankin explained, by shifting its electric power mix to more renewable sources of energy.

An Emera subsidiary has applied for a presidential permit to run an undersea cable from New Brunswick to Massachusetts. Clean Power Northeast Development's proposed 604-kilometre, 1,000 megawatt undersea cable, dubbed the Atlantic Link, would carry energy from Muskrat Falls in Labrador and seven windfarms in Atlantic Canada down to a decommissioned nuclear station in Plymouth, Mass.

The presidential permit application, filed on Monday through the U.S. Department of Energy, kicks off reviews from a variety of federal agencies on the project's environmental impact and the effect it will have on the reliability of power delivery to target markets.

"Atlantic Link is a reliable, cost-effective solution to help Massachusetts meet its energy diversity and greenhouse gas emissions reduction goals," said Dan Muldoon, Emera's executive vice-president for major renewables and alternative energy, in a news release announcing the permit application.

"This transmission line's direct connection to Massachusetts will ensure benefits such as energy, taxes, construction activity and low income programs all stay with Massachusetts residents and electricity customers."

Re: "HRM takes a step on mobility plan" (Dec. 6 story). Fantastic news that HRM council is moving a step closer to a commuter rail. Now let's hope they instruct HRM Centre Plan staff to develop growth scenarios that include this passenger rail corridor. Understanding how the convenience of a new commuter route connecting stations at downtown Halifax, Halifax West End, Rockingham, Mill Cove, Sunnyside, Bedford Common, Cobequid and further will influence development patterns is essential.

Repeated requests by citizens for growth scenarios based on a commuter rail and, as well, a growth scenario using infill and vacant lands on the Halifax Peninsula and inside Dartmouth's Circumferential Highway, have been ignored. Instead, the draft Centre Plan remains fixated on targeted growth scenarios where certain developers own land and want to build high-rises.

Yes, we want to densify the Centre Plan area, but growth can be distributed and need not rely on demolishing the historic character buildings and beautiful treed streetscapes of the city. Let's see what a redeveloped West End Mall or other rail corridor station locations could accommodate. And the redevelopment of the Peninsula's automotive dealership locations.

And just why is Cogswell not included as part of the Centre Plan growth scenarios? Peggy Cameron, Halifax
